



#### THE PRINCESS OF WALES'S ROYAL REGIMENT - 2002.

The Regiment is in fine form and just about fully recruited. This is unique in today's army and is all thanks to the effort of many members of the Regiments Recruiting Teams and input of Regimental money.

The 1st Battalion is still based in Tidworth and returned for another tour of Kosovo in May 2002 in the armoured warrior role. The period covering the end of last year up to now has been hectic and busy. They had a training team in South Arabia, which was very successful. This did not receive much publicity as the emotive subject of British Troops training the South Arabian Forces might have caused a media nightmare.

C Company hosted a French Company from the 35 Infanterie Regiment and then went to Alsace to train with them. Their fresh rations of raw horse meat and armadillo giblets were questioned? The Battalion has returned to Pristina. The summer is the traditional fighting season and the Kosovo Albanian insurgents will be looking for the usual scrap.

Training has taken place in Otterburn, Dartmoor and Sennybridge to the usual mixture of good and really awful weather. The Battalion is in fine form.

The 2nd Battalion is based in Aldershot and will Arms Plot move to Ternhill (Shropshire) in August 2002. This means that they give up their role as mechanised infantry (Saxon) and move into a new role of difficult terrain and fast deployment. The Battalion has a new Commanding Officer, Lieut Colonel J P Clover MBE as Lieut Colonel S F Deakin OBE has been promoted and moved to the Staff. Arms Plot move time is a hectic period with a thousand one things to do, from administration along with recces and continual briefing of families and all ranks. They will just have time to settle in the new barracks, spending Christmas, and then off to Kenya in January for an exercise lasting 8 weeks. It is then into intensive Northern Ireland Training and deployment to Northern Ireland in June 2003. The Battalion will be sad to leave Aldershot. The Battalion will be hosting the Grand Reunion.

The 3rd Battalion is going from strength to strength with Lieut Colonel Patrick Crowley ensuring that life is worthwhile in the TA. The continued annual cycle of training has moved from fighting in woods or forests (FIWAF) to urban operations. Each different scenario requires separate specialist skills. The Battalion entered a successful team in the Cambrian Patrol competition in Wales and also exercised with the French in France. The Battalion's shooting team seem to win every competition in sight! There are also 23 members of the Battalion serving full time with the Regular Army in Sierra Leone, Bosnia, Kosovo, Cyprus and Germany. This is excellent and produces a professional backbone to the Battalion. Sport has also been covered with teams entering sailing, golf and adventurous training and a 50 mile charity run.

B (Queen's Regiment) Company, The London Regiment are now training at Platoon Offensive level which has involved weekend training sessions at SPTA and local areas.

The Company took part in the ceremony for the new Lord Mayor of London and joined the march past. They came second in the SF concentration for the UK. This was an excellent achievement. They also have FTRS soldiers serving in Bosnia and the UK. The Company is in fine form under the command of Major Alex Bond.

"C" (The Duke of Connaught's Own) PWRR Company, The Royal Rifle Volunteers goes from strength to strength. The Colonel of the Regiment visited the platoon in the Isle of Wight in February and saw training and gave a lecture on the Isle of Wight Rifles. This was to a packed hall of Company Personnel, Association Members and Cadets. They are now working up for Annual Camp in the Ukraine in September 2002.

In summary the Regiment is in fine form and well motivated.

Ted Gilkes says he remembers several of those mentioned in Jack Jones's account of the Hill 112 Battle. He asks has anyone news of Sgt Bob Tighie and although not mentioned in the write up he is also seeking the whereabouts of Sgt Dixie Dean. Ted went on to say that he left D Company in 1941 to join the Divisional Signal Regiment and from there he was posted to the Middlesex Yeomanry Signals serving with them in the Middle East and France and Germany until the war end.

Jeff Rolt says he was with A Company at the time of the Hill 112 Battle in the village of Baron. During the night of the 16th of July 1944 they lost six killed including the Platoon Sgt, Ernie Short.

Frank Bennion writing from Australia mentioned that he was pleasantly surprised in April 2001 when his family held a special 80th birthday party for him. He also said that he paid a visit to UK in 2001 and was able to spend some time with his friend Ralph Otto.

PWRR/Queen's Museum, in the Castle is, as he put it, looking good. Alf served with Roy Bishop in D Coy, 1st Battalion in Europe until the war end.

Roy Topley enclosing a letter with his subs referred to Roy Bishop's item in the last odd jottings. As far as he remembered the nebelwerfer bomb was about the size of a small 5 gallon oil drum which when it landed split in two with a great blast effect with little or no shrapnel. He said they were stonked quite often in those far off exciting days! He felt that Roy Bishop's shrapnel must have come from some other weapon.

Brian Drake rang the Secretary from Canada on Christmas Eve to wish him well and to say that he has started to save and will do his best to make the 2002 Reunion. If he makes it it will be his third attendance in a row. A keen fan of the internet he has put me in contact with several Diehards who are not currently members of the Association. They have been sent a copy of the last newsletter with an invitation to join us.

Alex Coghill told me that he recently had a heart attack but is on the mend and as he put it "still around to send in a subscription". I am sure we all wish him well.

Jock Hazlewood said that through the newsletter he has made contact with his old platoon commander Lt Chamberlain and another lad who was in the platoon in the 8th Battalion. The Diehard spirit lives on. He was last in contact with them both just prior to being wounded in Normandy.

We advise with the deepest regret that the following have died:-

ALLCHORNE – Clare, wife of Lieut Albert Allchorne died on the 17th of March 2002. The funeral was held at the Beckingham Crematorium on Friday the 22nd of March 2002.

BARBER – Colonel F C (Ali) OBE TD DL died peacefully on the 28th of May 2002. He served with 11 Para and 8 MX, commanded a Battalion of the Northamptons and was their Honorary Colonel for 12 years. His funeral was held on Thursday the 8th of June 2002 at the Thomas a Becket Church, Ramsey, Cambs.

BENN - Harry, 6856012, died on Thursday the 9<sup>th</sup> of May 2002 aged 79. He joined the 2/7th Battalion from the KRRC in May 1943 and he joined D Company (Mortars). In December 1945 he was transferred to the Royal Engineers serving until July 1946. The details of his funeral are not known.

BOSWELL – George Thomas, 6213459 died on Wednesday the 2nd of January 2002 aged 81. George enlisted on the 13th of June 1940 and after basic training was posted to the 1st Bn in Hong Kong where he joined C Coy. He was wounded in the right ankle during the Battle for Hong Kong and was taken prisoner with the rest of the Bn on Christmas Day 1941. He was on the Lisbon Maru when it was torpedoed and sunk on route to Japan in October 1942. On his return to UK, on the 1st of April 1946, he left the Army and he went to work with the Westminster Council where he stayed for 39 years. His funeral attended by a large number and friends and acquaintances took place at Breakspear Crematorium on Thursday the 10th of January 2002. The chief mourners were his widow, Joy Boswell, and his son and daughter in law, Debbie and lan. The Regiment was represented by members of the Hounslow Branch, namely Messrs J Raby, A Richardson and M Ward. They laid a Middlesex badged Poppy Wreath inscribed "With deepest sympathy - Middlesex Regimental Association".

BRADISH – Christopher Chinnick 6212446 died on the 26th of February 2002 aged 85. Chris joined up in March 1940 and served with 2/8th and then the 1st Battalion landing with them in Normandy in 1944. He was wounded outside Caen and when discharged from hospital he served for a time with the Cheshire Regiment rejoining the 1st Battalion some months later. He was demobbed in 1945. His funeral took place at Enfield Crematorium on the 14th of March 2002 with members from the Enfield Branch representing the Regiment.

CORNES – Kenneth Charles Henry 23051045 died on the 19th of November 2001, after a long and brave fight, aged 68. Ken joined the TA in 1952 and was then called up for his National Service in 1954. After he completed his regular service he joined the 9th Bn (595 LAA/SL Regt RA) where he served for some years. He was a good cross country runner and a good all round sportsman. He won many cups and medals. He attained the rank of Bombardier. His funeral took place at Southampton Crematorium shortly before Christmas.

CROOK – Leslie Maynard 6206765 died in April 2002 the exact date is not known, aged 87. He enlisted on the 30th of April 1939 and joined B Company of the 1/7th Battalion. After Dunkirk he joined the 51st Highland Division Training Team and spent the rest of the war, until his demobilization in January 1946, with that organisation. He was a Company Sgt Major. His funeral took place on Monday the 29th of April 2002 at the United Reform Church, Muswell Hill, followed by a cremation at the Enfield Crematorium. Brian Williams, Chairman of the Middlesex Branch of the Queen's Regimental Association represented the Regiment at the Enfield Crematorium.

D'ARCY – George TD DL died on the 20th of February 2002 aged 74. Colonel D'Arcy was President of the Enfield Branch of the Royal British Legion and as such he had a close relationship with our Enfield Branch. Only last year he became an Associate Member of the Association. He joined the Royal Navy (Fleet Air Arm) in May 1945 transferring to the Army, The Beds & Herts Regiment in October 1946 and was subsequently commissioned into the Royal Artillery in December 1947. Leaving the Regular Army in 1949 he then had a long career with the Territorial Army. His final posting being in Command of the Greater London Regiment RA. He was appointed

the Deputy Lieutenant for the London Borough of Enfield in 1977 and was still in post when he died. His funeral was held on the 28th of February at Our Lady of Mount Carmel and St George's Church in London Road Enfield. The local air cadets formed a Guard of honour. Members of the Enfield Branch were present to represent the Regiment.

DOWLEN - David Edward died on the 20th of January 2002 in the King Edward VII Hospital, Midhurst after a four month illness bravely borne. David was an old boy of Mill Hill where he captained the Cricket XI during his final year. On leaving school he was commissioned into the 9th Battalion, a member of 331 Battery. He left the Regiment when the Battery was transferred to another Regiment in 1941. He was a member of Lloyds for over fifty years during which time he was also a member of the Gardeners Livery Company of which he became Master. From 1975 to 2000 he was the Dinner Secretary for the 9th Battalion Dinners, later lunches. This was a task he carried out with tremendous success which earned the admiration of his fellow officers who gave him a suitable presentation at the lunch in the year 2000. During his lifetime he created three magnificent gardens, two at his homes in England and one in France. Particular mention was made at his funeral of his love of nature. He was an outstanding skier and, despite a heart attack in his early eighties, he surprised everyone by returning to this sport within a year. HARRIS – Mary Alice, wife of Bill Harris of the 2/7th Bn passed away on the 9th of November 2001 after 55 wonderful years of marriage. Greatly missed by all members of her extended family.

HART – Norman Frederick, 22725951, died in March 2002 aged 67. Norman was a member of A Company of the 1st Bn in the mid 1950's and was recalled for service with the Royal West Kents during the Suez Crisis. He was a friend of Brian Drake and on his recommendation he joined the Association earlier this year. The date and place of his funeral is not known to us.

HATCHER – William (Bill) died on the 22nd of November 2001. He was our oldest member and he served in World War One with the 8th Bn and the Machine Gun Corps. His funeral took place at Falconwood Crematorium on Friday the 28th of November 2001. Major Mike Eastap was present on behalf of the Regiment. Members will recall that in the last edition of the newsletter it was noted that Mike Eastap had attended his 104th birthday just a few days before he died.

LOMAX - Robert (known to many as Darkie), 6197213 died peacefully in his sleep on the 14th of November 2001 aged 92. He joined the 1st Bn in 1926, moving across to the 2nd Bn in 1927 staying with them until 1936. After two years at the Depot he was posted to the 1st Bn in 1937 and was with them until 1949 when he went to the 7th Bn for his last two years of service. He was a FEPOW taken in Hong Kong and then moved to Japan. In civilian life he served from a time with the Ta in the Royal Artillery. Eventually he found employment with the Westminster City Council finally retiring as a Senior Rating Inspector. He will be sorely missed by his daughter, grand and great grandchildren who always referred to him as "Great". His daughter Kay wrote from the USA to say that of his grandchildren, Robert William graduated from the US Naval Academy and was a pilot flying Orions and is now a Commander in US Naval Reserve, Amamda graduated from Yale and married a West Point graduate who is now a Lieut Colonel in the US Army Reserve and his daughter was commissioned in the WRAF. MALES, Herbert Ambrose BEM, (known as Bill) 6211953 died in April 2002, the exact date is not known, aged 85. Bill joined the Regiment in February 1940 and served as a regular for 23 years, leaving the Army in 1963 in the rank of CSgt. He served with the 2/7th, the 1/7th, and the 1st Bns, in that order. He was at the Depot between 1950 and 1954 and went on to be the Mess Sgt to the Officers' Mess in Cyprus. His funeral was held at the Southend Crematorium on the 15th of April 2002. Bob Clarke was present to represent the Regiment.

PAGE – Arthur, 6201260 died in his sleep, just before his 86th birthday, on the 7th of September 2001 from the effects of a stroke. He was a patient in the Countess of Chester Hospital As his daughter put it, it was a merciful release. Arthur was in D Company of the 1st Bn taken prisoner in Hong Kong and was eventually moved to Kobe House, Tokyo via the Lisbon Maru. After leaving the Regiment he served with the Rhodesia Regiment from 1952 until 1955. His funeral took place on the 17th of September 2001 at Blacon Crematorium, Chester.

REED – Mike, Barry Reed's wife, who was christened Patricia but always known as Mike, died at Crakehall, North Yorkshire on Monday 11th March 2002. She had suffered for many years from severe rheumatoid arthritis and she fought this affliction with great courage. The funeral took place at St Gregory's Church, Crakehall, and the Rev Mgr Ralph Brown took part in the service. The large numbers present reflected the great affection which Mike inspired in so many people; a marquee had been erected to the house the overflow from the church. RUTHERFORD – Ian Sinclair died after a long illness on the 4th of January 2002 aged 71. Ian was a subaltern with the 1st Bn in Korea. His funeral took place on the 15th of January 2002 at Putney Vale Crematorium.

SIMMONS - George Alfred, 22229344 and 496453, died suddenly on Saturday the 23rd of February 2002 aged 72. George apparently in good health was found sitting in his kitchen after suffering a heart attack. He enlisted on the 13th of May 1948 and after training at the Depot he joined the 1st Battalion just prior to the move to Hong Kong. He served almost continuously with the 1st Battalion in Korea, Cyprus, Austria, Gibraltar, Northern Ireland and Guyana. In 1967 he was selected for service with the Brigade of Ghurkhas and posted back to Hong Kong. In 1973 he returned to the Regiment being commissioned and posted to 1 Queen's as the MTO where he stayed until joining the Cadet Training Team at Maidstone for his last tour of duty before leaving the Army in 1980. His funeral was held on Tuesday the 4th of March at St Mary's Church, Langley. The church was full to overflowing. George would have been particularly pleased with the large turn out from the Regiment. At the reception after the service one could hear many anecdotes being exchanged all outlining what a wonderful sense of humour George had and how kind he was to the soldiers under his command. He was a soldier's soldier who lived for the Regiment. He will be greatly missed.

SLATER – Frederick William, 6206574, died on the 26th of November 2001 aged 85. Fred joined the 1/7th Bn in 1939 and went to France with them in 1940. Badly wounded he was evacuated via Dunkirk and was subsequently discharged in 1941 as medically unfit for further service. The funeral took place at Clacton Cemetery during the afternoon of Tuesday the 4th of December 2001.

STEVENS – John Garston, OBE, 145679 died on the 24th of March 2002 after a short illness. He was just short of his 85th birthday. He served with the PLKR before being commissioned and joining the 2/7th Bn serving with them until being taken prisoner at the Anzio Beachhead. He subsequently escaped coming back through the allied lines in Italy. He transferred to the RAOC and served until 1976 attaining the rank of Colonel. His funeral was held at St Martin's Church, Fivehead on Thursday the 4th of April 2002.

SUMMERS – Clive Wilsón TD, died on the 29th of December 2001 aged 90. He joined the 8th Bn on the 3rd of June 1933 and was serving with the 1/8th Bn on mobilization in 1939. He was seriously injured in a car accident in 1941 and during his period of recovery was posted to the 70th Bn. He subsequently joined the Royal Northumberland Fusiliers and was badly wounded at Salerno. After the war Clive joined the 5th Bn of the Queen's Royal Regiment and from there he went to the 10th Bn of the Surrey Home Guard as the Major in charge of training. When the Home Guard disbanded he continued serving with the 2nd Cadet Bn of the Queen's Royal Regiment finally ending his service in 1966 when he became a local councillor in Woking. His funeral took place at Chichester Crematorium on Friday the 11th of January 2002.

TAWNEY – Tony died on the 15th of January 2002. His funeral service took place on the 30th of January 2002 at Luton Crematorium. He was the son-in-law of Major Dick Smith.

TUTHILL – Albert Edward, 6200867 died on the 5th of December 2001 aged 92.. He joined the 1/7th Bn in 1932 and left in 1946 having attained the rank of C Sgt.. He carried on serving informally for a time playing the flute in the Middlesex TA Band. Albert was happily married to Florence for 62 years living in Holloway N7. He was born in Stoke Newington. He was with the Bn at Dunkirk and after two days on the beaches he and another Sgt found a rowing boat and they were two miles off the English coast when they were picked up. He worked in the building trade for many years until joining the Metropolitan Water Board where he made many friends. He retired in the 1970s and remained in Holloway where he and his wife enjoyed a long and happy retirement. The funeral took place on the 14th of December at Basildon Crematorium. Florence had a full cross made up in the Regimental Colours. The funeral was attended by a loving family and friends and afterwards at Benfleet, Essex where Albert will be laid to rest close to his devoted family.

WARD – Dinah, wife of Mike Ward, Secretary of the Hounslow Branch, died on Wednesday the 22nd of May 2002 after a short illness. The Funeral took place at the South West Middlesex Crematorium Hounslow on Thursday the 30th of May 2002. The very large congregation of family and friends showed what a well loved and popular lady she was. After the service the family made those attending welcome at the British Airways Concord Club.

WOOKEY – Joyce, wife of Frank Wookey of the 1st Bn, died on the 25th of January 2002 after a long fight against cancer. She was 79 years of age.

# Colonel Ian Dryhurst Brotherton 1920 - 2002.

Colonel Ian gave some sixty five years of service to the Regiment and the Regimental Association up to the date of his death. His war service and long experience of the TA commanded the respect of both the professional and amateur soldier.

lan was born in Shanghai where his father had settled on leaving the merchant navy but the family moved to Hampton when he was five. He lived in this corner of Middlesex for most of his life. From Hampton Grammar School he won a scholarship to Kings College London but in common with so many young men of his generation his academic progress was interrupted by the war. He enlisted in the 1/8th Battalion of the Regiment at Hampton Drill Hall in June 1939 and moved with hardly a break from annual camp to wartime service. His leadership potential must have been recognised at an early stage as he was an Acting Corporal within three months of joining. After attending OCTU at Aldershot he was commissioned into the Regiment in February 1940 and posted to the 1/7th Battalion for a few months before attending a machine gun training course and returning to the 8th Battalion. Life was a hectic mix of courses, exercises and the usual duties of a junior officer. At that time after Dunkirk when invasion seemed likely the priority was to turn amateur soldiers into professionals in the minimum possible time. Someone had the good sense to capilitise on lan's interest in wireless, he had made his first receiver at the age of fifteen, and sent him on a signals instructors course at Catterick. Subjects covered as well as wireless training included morse, cable laying and use of the heliograph by moonlight! At the end of the course he was graded "distinguished" and shortly after his return to the Battalion he was appointed RSO and promoted to Temporary Captain in December 1941. His CO must have regarded a signals officer who had such an extraordinary technical grasp of what was then wireless as a rare and precious commodity.

During this time of waiting the Battalion was stationed in various places in East Anglia and Southern England and he met Margaret (Maggie) in January 1943 when she was serving in the ATS and driving ambulances and staff cars. They became engaged, his engagement present was a wireless he had made himself, and married in June of that year.

Rumour has it that he played a small part in the Battle of Britain. Some of our south coast radar had jamming problems but Ian popped over and soon sorted them out. He took the intensive training seriously, a diary entry records "route march twenty seven miles in pouring rain – full kit in eleven and a half hours a Battalion record" but it had its

lighter side another entry reading "Blew up twenty windows fitted that afternoon – boxing in the evening" With his enquiring mind and urge to experiment he did not readily accept prescribed army procedures. An attempt to mount wireless sets onto a motorcycle caused damage to both sets and machine as well as the Signals Sgt and was soon abandoned.

By 1944 as well as the machine guns one company was equipped with 4.2" mortars and it sailed from the West India Docks in the Empire Newton, crossed the channel on the night of the 19th of June under shellfire and disembarked by landing craft in very rough seas at Ouistreham. The Battalion was heavily involved in the advance to the Dutch frontier and lan remembered the bombing of Caen which was so intense that his mess tin of tea fell off the wing of his signals truck. In September his vehicle ran into a Tiger Tank on the approach to Nijmegen Bridge and he suffered shrapnel wounds to his face and left arm. He was invalided home for two months and some of the metal was extracted but he carried the remainder for the rest of his life. On his return to the Battalion his diary notes that he appreciated that his CO (Lt Col M Crawford) had "kindly kept the RSOs job open for me". He was mentioned in despatches and awarded the Croix de Guerre the citation for which reads "This Officer took an active part in the operations in France in June, July and August. He was always in the forward areas maintaining communications under very trying conditions. He was completely fearless and showed outstanding devotion to duty throughout the campaign." He fought with the Battalion for the remainder of the war and was demobbed in July 1946.

lan then took a well earned break from the army to concentrate on his young family (he had three daughters) and his studies. He obtained a Bsc in Physics and pure and applied mathematics in June 1951.

After this pause for breath he rejoined the TA (11 Para) in 1951 and completed his parachute training course at RAF Abingdon. He soon became a Company Commander and by 1957 when the unit was redesignated 8MX he was commanding the Battalion. During his time with the 8th Battalion he introduced the tradition of entering a Battalion Team in the Nijmegen Marches and led the final one. This must have recalled memories of his dangerous first visit to the Town ten years earlier. On the amalgamation of the 7th, 8th and 9th Battalions in 1961 he was given command of the "new" 5th Battalion. Although he was undoubtedly helped by the process of selection and elimination involved in the merger it is arguable that his style of leadership, hard work and play accompanied by the occasional unexpected surprise created the best post war Middlesex TA Battalion at a time when embodiment as a unit for overseas service was a possibility. He certainly managed to resolve the cultural differences between three constituent Battalions in a very short time. It is perhaps significant that on giving up command he had the rare distinction in the much reduced TA of being promoted to Brevet Colonel serving within HQ East Anglian Division as AQMG (Mov).

He was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant for the County of Middlesex in 1964 and served as Colonel Commandant of the Middlesex ACF from 1965 to 1968. On leaving this job

he was ADC to the Queen (TAVR) for a five year term.

For more years than any present member of the Executive Committee can remember Colonel Ian served the interests of the Regimental Association right up to the date of his death. His contributions based on sound common sense and his particular blend of military and business experience were much valued. For many years he was Chairman of the Housing Committee and vice Chairman of the Association.

He was not handicapped by starting his civilian career six years late. He worked for electronic companies including GEC, Plessey, and the Rank Organisation initially in a technical role but soon in managerial jobs and at the end of his career as a managing director with responsibility for substantial budgets and a large workforce.

He did not, of course, retire at sixty five to indulge in his hobbies of radio and photography but capitalised on another by moving from Shepperton to Wimborne, passing the necessary examinations and becoming a sailing instructor. He set up a school based in Lymington Harbour teaching students up to yachtmaster standard . Well into his seventies he undertook cross channel cruises often in foul weather. His boat was, hardly surprisingly, equipped with the latest radio and electronic navigation aids but he denied his students access to these to ensure they learned basic navigation.

Radio provided a lifetimes interest for lan. As a boy he was talking to the world on his homemade set and in the early nineteen fifties made a television set with a nine inch screen in a large wooden box for his family before the world had grasped that this new medium might have a future in the mass market.

It is difficult to sum up the life of a man who seems to have crammed a mile and a half into every mile of distance run. He never complained and rarely thought that inaction ever solved problems. He was on occasions intolerant of those who failed to give their best but did not judge them by his own high standards. Many of his achievements would not have been possible without the support of Maggie and his three daughters all of who survive him and of whom he was so proud. He was one of those rare natural leaders who will be missed by his many friends and all who served with him

#### Captain Ian Thomas Mc Millan 1921 - 2002.

The following has been extracted from the address made at Tom's funeral by Major C L Lawrence MC. The funeral took place on Friday the 17th of May 2002 at the Minster Church of St Denys, Warminster.

"lan Thomas McMillan was born on the 16th of August 1921 in New Zealand. He was one of five, one brother and three sisters and they were a close family. His forbears had emigrated from Scotland in the early 1800s.

At the beginning of the Great War Tom's father enlisted into the New Zealand Army and came over to fight for King and Country as did so many other members of the Empire. He was wounded, sent to Torquay where he met and married Tom' mother. Tom's elder brother, Jack, was born and they moved to New Zealand where Tom's father had been farming. Two sisters appeared and then father was killed in an accident. Mother being pregnant with the youngest sister returned home to Torquay which is where Tom was really brought up.

With the last war looming Tom joined the TA, the Devonshire Regiment, and served with them throughout the war. In 1944 Tom, being a Machine Gun Instructor, was transferred to the 2/7th Battalion in Palestine. In December 1945 he went with them to Egypt where they were disbanded and Tom was demobbed. However he could not settled down and after three months he re-enlisted and was posted to the 2nd Battalion in Palestine. He rapidly became a WOII and remained with the Battalion (which very soon amalgamated with the 1st Battalion) through Chelsea Barracks, Hong Kong & Korea, Austria and Cyprus. After about a year in Cyprus he was posted as RSM to the 8th Battalion in Hounslow. The Battalion had just relinquished its role as a Parachute Battalion (11 Para) and Tom was looked upon with a certain amount of resentment. However in his quiet and unassuming way he steered the Battalion through the changeover to become a successful and well recruited unit. It was at Hounslow that Tom met Jean, her father being the landlord of the Crossed Lancers that was next to the Drill Hall. They married on the 24th of October 1958. In December 1958 Tom was appointed RSM of the 1st Battalion in Hamelin, in 1961 he moved to the Buffs TA in Canterbury where they had a very happy three years, and then to Sennelager where he was Garrison Sergeant Major for fifteen months.

In 1965 he was appointed to a Short Service Commission and rejoined the 1st Battalion who were by now in Palace Barracks in Northern Ireland. Tom remained with the Battalion until disbandment in 1970. He then went to the Junior Soldier's Company at Bassingbourn for two years and his final two years were spent as Adjutant of the School of Infantry in Warminster.

Tom retired in 1974 and almost immediately joined a local firm – Flying Goose which was in the frozen food business, remaining with them until finally retiring in 1986 at age 65 having achieved the position of Shipping Manager.

Now, Tom as a person. There was no doubt that he was a bit of a martinet. He was always extremely smart, of the outmost integrity and with very high standards. He did not accept second rate. However he always engendered a feeling of respect at whatever level.......

As many of you know Tom suffered and I mean really suffered from illness for much of his later life. Not long after he commissioned he developed a stomach ulcer which at first he chose to ignore. However as things got worse he reported sick and despite scans, x rays and other tests nothing could be found. It was even suggested it was all in the mind! Finally not long before his sixtieth birthday they pushed an endoscope down him and surprise surprise there was an ulcer so big that they had



to remove four fifths of his stomach. Then about two years ago Tom developed cancer of the small colon which led to tumours on the liver. Once again he suffered stoically, but this time there was nothing that could be done for him except to offer palliative medicines. A lesser man would have given in months ago but Tom was a fighter and in the end he did what old soldiers are supposed to do, he just faded away, defiant to the last.

So how will we remember him? He was a kind man who loved his family and was very proud of them. He had, as already mentioned, the utmost integrity, he had a lively sense of fun. He was, and is, held in great esteem and affection by his old comrades, a fact I can personally vouch for. Above all Tom was a true Diehard and a Gentleman, and I am proud to have been looked upon as a friend."

# Major Michael Peter Desmond Eastap 1930 - 2002.

Major Mike Eastap who died on the 17th of May 2002 in his 72nd year was the long serving and well respected Chairman of the Korean Club which he joined soon after its formation.

Mike was born in Derbyshire on 17th September 1930 and educated at the Duke of York's School, Dover. In 1947 he enlisted under age and after basic training at the Home Counties Brigade Training Centre was posted to the 2nd Battalion of the Middlesex Regiment in Palestine. After the amalgamation of the battalions at Mill Hill in 1948 he served with the 1st Battalion on public duties at Chelsea Barracks and moved with it to Hong Kong in 1949.

In Korea Mike was in A Company where as a sergeant he commanded 3 Platoon which was without an officer and did so to the complete satisfaction of the Company Commander, now Brigadier Dennis Rendell. They marched side by side in the Korean Contingent at the Cenotaph in November 2000.

After returning to the UK in 1952 Mike moved with the Battalion to Austria in 1953 where he became a sergeant in the MMG Platoon.

Still serving with the 1st Battalion Mike went to Cyprus for a three year tour in 1955 and then, after a period of secondment service in Borneo during the Confrontation, returned again to the 1st Battalion in Northern Ireland and Guyana by then as a CSM of Headquarter Company.

On promotion to WOI in the Queen's Regiment he was posted to command the Cadet Training Team for South East London based at Woolwich until his commissioning into the Royal Regiment of Fusiliers serving with their 2nd Battalion in Berlin and Catterick where he retired from the Army in 1972.

After a period running his own removal business in Yorkshire Mike was alerted to a vacancy for a Cadet Executive Officer in South East London by Major Reg Ford who was already established in Middlesex and North West London ACF. With his experience in the Cadet Training Team Mike was a natural choice for the appointment which he held from 1981 until his final retirement in 1994.

It was a post ideally suited to his talent for administration and for getting on with people whatever their background or origins. His success and his popularity in this role was demonstrated by the presence at his funeral of all three of his surviving Cadet Commandants.

For involvement with St John Ambulance during this period Mike was appointed a Serving Brother of the Order of St John of Jerusalem. A jaunty cheerful personality, usually smiling and often laughing he was universally well liked. He will be sadly missed, most of all by his family to whom he was devoted.

He is survived by his wife Betty and three daughters.

#### 1. Opening Remarks.

1.1. The Chairman opened the meeting by thanking all for attending. He said that Col Brotherton had been admitted to hospital and so could not attend this meeting.

#### 2. Minutes of the last Meeting.

2.1 It was agreed that the minutes of the meeting held on the 5th of March 2001 were a true record. Proposed by Col Cain and seconded by Mr Ward. Carried.

# 3. Matters Arising.

3.1. There were no matters arising that were not covered for the Agenda for this meeting.

# 4. Secretary's Report.

- 4.1. The Secretary presented his report that had been previously circulated.
- 4.2. The following grants were approved for 2002:-

Royal Star & Garter Home £100 MX and NW London ACF £950

Retrospective authority given to cover the overspend of £67 at the 2001 Guildhall Service.

# 5. Finance Committee Chairman's Report.

5.1. Brig Marciandi presented the accounts for the Regimental Association and the 5/6th Militia that had been previously circulated. He said the Committee had last year held their usual meetings to consider reports from the Broker and that the arrangement with the Broker to manage our investments on a discretionary basis was working well. For example he was able to act very quickly to minimise any possible loss arising from the Enron failure. Very good income this year largely rising from generous donations and bequests. The disastrous performance of the stock market has caused a

considerable drop in the value of our investments. He was however hopeful of an eventual recovery. The large cash holdings shown with the Broker have been reduced by further investment. Although it was no longer necessary to list our investments in wide and narrow portfolios care was still being taken to hold a goodly number of our holdings in safe investments. Brig Marciandi drew attention to the considerable expenditure from the Militia Account to preserve and the clean the Colours in St Paul's. Maj Couch asked if the there would be a change of Stock Broker if the accounts moved to the RHQ PWRR. The answer yes.

5.2. Brig Marciandi asked the Committee to approve the accounts. It was proposed by Maj Couch and seconded by Mr Burford that they be so approved for the year ending 31 December 2001. Carried.

#### 6. The Future of the Association.

- 6.1. Capt Doran presented the paper on the future administration of the Association. He said it was a logical step forward in that we had moved our Museum into the National Army Museum, handed over our Memorial Homes to Haig Homes and with the forthcoming retirement of the Secretary it was now time to change the way we conduct our affairs.
- 6.2. We have tried to find a replacement Secretary by advertising in both the PWRR Journal and the Diehard Newsletter and by making approaches via various senior Officers. Only one applicant who could not make himself available until late 2004.
- 6.3. The offer from the PWRR to conduct our affairs was not as good as we hoped but as was pointed out at the meeting held in January the RHQ are facing reductions in establishment and so they would not make promises about the future they could not keep. Col Ball reaffirmed that all the Associations are to be treated equally and those regiments currently looked after at RHQ would, from a future date, be administered in exactly the same way as the MX.
- 6.4. Capt Doran said a plus point is that more money will be available for charitable purposes, economies of scale etc. Minus points loss of our independence and the newsletter in its present form.
- 6.5. We have been asked to nominate a member to join the PWRR Trustees as the MX Representative. Brig Bulloch said he would be pleased to represent the Regiment and this was agreed. Capt Doran said it will be necessary to downsize the current Executive Committee to a Committee of say 5 or 7 strong. This Committee will be the point of contact for the PWRR as and when required.
- 6.6. Brig Marciandi said that although the funds will be handed over to the PWRR they will remain ring fenced MX and accounted for separately. Capt Enthoven asked that if branches, clubs etc required financial assistance how would it be obtained. Maj Couch said he thought the proposals were a good progression forward but he was also concerned about the future control of funds. Col Ball said that branches etc seeking financial support would need to apply to the RHQ PWRR. Should it be necessary the

RHQ would refer to application back to the MX Committee for a decision.

- 6.7. Capt Doran said there would be a need to seek approval for these changes both of the Charity Commission and our members at the forthcoming AGM. He said he would liase with the Secretary over this. There will also be a requirement to amend the rules of the Association.
- 6.8. Mr Ward said that the newsletter holds members together and he thought it should continue. He volunteered to take this on. His offer was gratefully accepted.

# 7. Functions for the year 2002.

- 7.1. It was noted that the following functions have been arranged for 2002:-
- 11th May The Albuhera Service of Remembrance at St Paul's Cathedral at 3pm followed by the Reunion and AGM at the Victory Services Club in the evening.
- 16th May Annual Albuhera Luncheon at the National Army Museum. The NAM this year are the hosts.
- 9th November Annual Service of Remembrance at the Middlesex Guildhall.
- 7.2. The Committee approved the following grants to meet the cost of the above functions:-

Annual Service up to £2750

The Reunion & AGM up to £3000 (tickets this year to be priced at £8.00p)

Service at Middlesex Guildhall up to £300.

# 8. The Colours in the Regimental Chapel.

- 8.1. Maj Couch said that the Colours Sub Committee should meet when the Colours are rehung to view and consider what action, if any, should be taken with regard to future conservation. Maj Couch also suggested that Committee Members, when in London, might wish to visit St Paul's to view the Colours for themselves. Very important decisions to be made. To be discussed at the next Executive Committee Meeting.
- 8.2 Col Ball said it might be of interest to know that the Northamptons formally buried the Colours that were no longer viable. This might be worth considering.

# 9. The three members at Enfield.

9.1 Col Cain gave an outline of the events that took place at Enfield. Maj Lawrence

read out extracts from an unsigned letter received by him. Mr Burford said that intimidation and unpleasant unsigned letters were still being received by those at Enfield. Capt Doran has drafted a reply to the letter received by the Chairman that the Secretary was instructed to send on behalf of this Committee.

#### 10. Soldiers shot at dawn.

10.1 After some discussion it was agreed that the eight soldiers names shot at dawn during World War One would be added to our Roll of Honour under the heading of victims of war. The Secretary is to write to Mrs Jansen informing her of this.

#### 11. Any other business.

- 11.1 Agreed that the final meeting of this Committee should be held in early March 2003 (possibly the 3rd) at a location still to be decided. The meeting to take place at 1100 hours it having been preceded by the Officers' Club Meeting and that all attending be invited to a luncheon funded by the Association. It was suggested that the following should be invited as guests: our President, the Colonel of the PWRR, our Secretary and the Assistant Secretary.
- 11.2 Col Hewson said he had visited the NAM and was disappointed at the number of items from our collection on display.
- 11.3 Mr Burford asked if we were aware that Inglis Barracks was to be sold off shortly. He asked if this occurred what would happen to the War Memorial. Maj Lawrence replied to say that he had been in contact with the Chief Executive of the BFPO and had been told that nothing had been finally decided but they were aware of our interest. Should the Memorial require to be moved then the cost is to be borne by the Ministry of Defence. Col Cain thought that if it had to be moved then the best site would be by the old entrance to the barracks.
- 11.4 The Secretary gave details of two functions that had not been listed on our forecast of events, namely:-
  - 12 May Victorian Diehard Company at Aldershot Military Museum .
  - 7 July Grand Day at Normandy Bks Aldershot (2 PWRR)

He will include this information for members with the March Mailing.

# 12. Date and Place of Next meeting.

12.1. It was suggested that the RAG might be a good location. Secretary to investigate and report back.
